Mr. Miles suggested *The Night of January 16th* (TNoJ16) as a possible play for my capstone. After reading it, however, I decided that it was difficult for the actors and the audience. This play is a court case that requires actors to memorize long statements and long dialogues between witnesses and the lawyers. For a high school play, is not appropriate because it is long and requires serious focus. So we decided to drop this play as an option. However, I valued the way Raynd uses one setting in the play because my play is similar in format. So I learned from the way the play was written but decided it was not as helpful as a play. This play was also very different from the other play I read *The Importance of Being Earnest*, which is a comedy and takes place in multiple settings with a variety of dialogues and monologues.
