For many years Blacks were trying to obtain freedom. They were disregarded by the Government and even the people around them. One of the only places that Blacks could consider home was church. Not just any church, but their own. A church named "First African Baptist Church" was founded in 1848, which is located in Richmond, Virginia. Many black slaves, along with free blacks worshipped in a biracial congregation that was usually controlled by White people. The Black members were forced to sit in the back or even in the galleries during the services. Once they were emancipated Blacks started to create their own churches. Blacks didn't just create a church, they created a place of worship. In the churches there are housed schools, social events, political gatherings, and fraternal societies. One of the best accomplishments during the Reconstruction era for Blacks was building churches. Blacks have found a way to have freedom and they started with church. Lincoln's Involvement


