# **Component #1: Narration**

#### What's this element?

## What's the impact on the reader?

# Component #2: Point Of View

#### What's this element?

The author is letting the reader read the character's mind at the moment when the character is in some type of fear. By using point of view, there is narration going on by the character is have a physical conversation but also talking to herself.

## Why does it matter?

Expressing feeling and showing feeling are two different things. In this case the character is expressing her feeling by talking to herself in her mind and not really showing the emotions she feels at the moment.



### What's the impact on the reader?

It makes the reader know that she is scared. The reader is experiencing situational irony. When we as the readers know what's happening but no so much of the other characters. I think the author uses situational irony because there are other thoughts that needed to be mentioned so readers can get a better understanding.

# Component #3: Sentence-Based

#### What's this element?
